





What is Automatic Renewal?

You no longer need to manually renew some of your library items – our automatic renewal service will take care of the renewals for you! All items eligible for renewal will be automatically renewed one day before their due date (up to maximum number of renewals). Please be aware that not all items will auto-renew.

How does it work?

Any items on your account that are eligible for renewal will be renewed automatically at 9 PM one day before their due date.

How will I know an item was renewed?

You can check your due dates via your <u>online account</u>. Please note automatic renewals run at 9 PM the day before items are due.

If you have an email address associated with your account, you will receive an email notification the evening before your items are due. The email will list which items were successfully renewed and which items were not, if applicable. You can make changes to your email notifications via your online account or by calling or visiting a Bucks County library.

Which items are eligible for renewal?

Most physical items are eligible for renewal as long as another patron has not placed a hold on the item and your account is in good standing. <u>The number of allowable renewals differs per item type</u>.

Items will NOT renew automatically if:

- There is a hold on the item by other patrons.
- The item has already been renewed the maximum number of times.
- Your account has over \$20 in charges or if your account is blocked or expired.
- The item is part of a non-renewable collection such as Lucky Day, magazines, etc.
- The item was requested from outside Bucks County through Interlibrary Loan.

Can I still renew manually?

Yes. If you wish to renew an item prior to its automatic renewal date, simply renew it through your <u>online account</u> or speak to a staff member at any <u>Bucks County library</u>. Manual renewals will extend the borrowing period from the date of renewal.

Can I opt-out of automatic renewals?

No, patrons cannot opt out of automatic renewals. If you do not want your items to auto-renew, you can return them before the due date.

String Too Short to be Saved: Recollections of Summers on a New England Farm by Donald Hall Recommended by Shelly

A warm collection of memories written by poet and children's book author Donald Hall who grew up spending summers on his grandparents' New Hampshire farm. He tells of warm stoves to get changed by on chilly mornings, glasses of milk before bed and wooden barns to explore. He amusingly describes discovering the hand-written label on a box of short strings in the attic which served as inspiration for the title of this memoir.

The book is full of nostalgia and comfort, yet the stories become tinged with something else as Hall grows older. He sees both his grandparents and the farm start to age. As he observes these changes and wonders about the fate of the farm, he ponders the underlying ideas of permanence and mortality.

Fret not, the epilogue provides a satisfying outcome for both Hall and the farm, along with photos of the ancestral residents throughout the years.




Lula Dean's Little Library of Banned Books by Kirsten Miller Recommended by Marie

For the book lover in all of us, Kirsten Miller's new novel is a timely satire about a small Southern town embattled in a war over banning books and a little lending library that changes the life of every resident in town.

Enemies Beverly Underwood and Lula Dean live in the tiny town of Troy, Georgia, where Beverly serves on the school board and Lula has become a local celebrity by making it her mission to rid the public library of all books she deems as inappropriate. Lula decides to start her own little lending library in front of her home filled with books she believes should be staples in everyone's library – like *The Southern Belle's Guide to Etiquette* and *Our Confederate Heroes*.

One night, Beverly's daughter Lindsay secretly fills Lula's little free library with banned books wrapped in Lula's "wholesome" dust jackets. *The Girl's Guide to the Revolution* is wrapped in the cover of *The Southern Belle's Guide to Etiquette*, and *Our Confederate Heroes* ends up on a copy of *Beloved*. Soon, everyone in town who borrows books from Lula Dean's library finds their lives changed in unexpected ways and when Lindsay's scheme is discovered, the showdown between Beverly and Lula comes to a head and the whole town is changed forever. A fun, sweet, surprising read!

Health Education Program



WiFi Hotspots @ Free Library of Northampton Township

Going somewhere and unsure if wireless internet is available?

Have a wireless device but no internet service?

The answers to these questions are @ your library – check out one of our WiFi Hotspots!

- Loan Period = One (1) Week
- No Renewals
- Connect up to 8 devices
- Battery Life = 8 hours of continuous use
- All you need to use is a WiFi enabled device



- Patron may not borrow a Hotspot for at least two (2) nights after returning one
- Patron may borrow a Hotspot no more than six (6) times per calendar year
- Overdue Fine is \$5.00 per day / max. \$25.00
- If a hotspot is lost, \$100.00 will be charged
- Once the maximum fine has been reached, the Hotspot's data service will be suspended until it has been returned to the library in working condition
